Which states have any form of guaranteed or automatic admission policy for high school students who meet certain criteria?

Our Response:

ECS conducted a scan of state admission policies and found that 10 states have some version of guaranteed admission to four-year public institutions. These policies are set in legislation, board or system policy. The majority of these states have statewide minimum admission requirements for their public institutions.
